Since 2011, NYSEG's refrigerator/freezer recycling program has prevented more than 30,000 refrigerators and freezers from going to landfills.

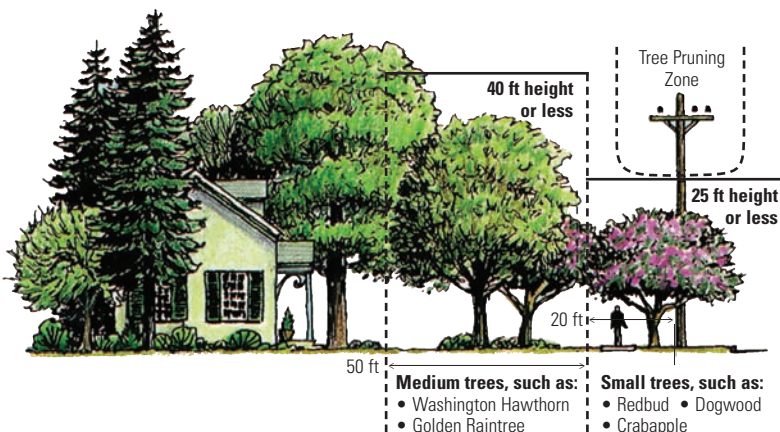

Stay Safe When Working Outdoors Know What's Below. Call 811 Before You Dig.

Whether you're a contractor or homeowner doing an outdoor project, having underground facilities marked is essential to protect yourself from injury and prevent damage to underground utility lines. It's easy – simply call Dig Safely New York at **811** two working days (not including the day you call) but not more than 10 working days before you plan to start your project.



Remember:

- Water and electricity NEVER mix. Keep power tools and extension cords away from water, including rain, wet ground, swimming pools, sprinklers and garden hoses.
- Have a licensed electrician add weatherproof covers and GFCIs (ground-fault circuit interrupters) to outdoor electrical outlets to protect against electrical shock.
- Leave cutting and pruning of trees near power lines to professionals. A tree or limb that comes in contact with a power line could be deadly.

Look Up...Look Out!

If you're headed outdoors with a list of home improvement projects, remember to watch overhead. When working around your house, remember that aluminum siding, gutters and ladders conduct electricity. If these touch an overhead power line the results could be deadly. And if your project includes tree pruning, please don't prune near power lines.



Driving Change

Our use of environmentally-friendly vehicles supports NYSEG's and our parent company's (Iberdrola USA) commitment to innovative technologies and renewable energy resources.

NYSEG hybrid bucket trucks in the Mechanicville, Binghamton and Ithaca areas can be spotted by their specially-designed graphics letting you know these vehicles cut emissions and reduce noise. Once the truck is at the job site, the diesel engine can be shut off and the bucket can be operated on battery power. "The electric motor can run quietly without any background noise, so it doesn't disturb nearby customers or impede spoken communication between our aerial worker and the ground crew," said John Zdimal, NYSEG construction and maintenance supervisor in Binghamton.
