

# Understanding electric bill charges\*

**\$36.63** goes to government requirements and taxes.

\$69.97 is a pass-through cost from supply.

\$60.37 goes to operations, maintenance, customer service, administrative costs, and continued investments into the grid.

# Basic Service Charge/Delivery Charge

\$18.88

Approximately one-quarter of these two charges goes towards taxes and funding energy efficiency requirements. **These are government required charges.** 

#### **Transition Charge**

\$2.94

Over half of this charge goes towards state government programs and mandates, like the Electric Vehicle Make-Ready Program. These charges are not individually shown on the bill. **These are government required charges.** 

## System Benefits Charge (SBC)

\$3.96

Approximately 3% of the total bill for a typical residential customer is used to fund clean energy activities overseen by the state.

These are government required charges.

# Basic Service Charge/Delivery Charge

\$56.64

Approximately three-quarters of these two charges goes towards delivery, customer service, and investments into the grid.

## **Transition Charge**

\$1.87

The remaining part of this charge reflects the difference between the market price of electricity and the price of NYSEG's long-term electricity supply contracts from when it owned power generation (this may be a positive or negative charge).

#### Revenue Decoupling Charge

\$1.79

A credit or charge on the bill that reflects the difference between forecasted and actual delivery service revenues

# Recovery Charge

\$12.37

This is the repayment of costs from legacy storm recovery.

# Supply Charge:

\$69.97

Supply is a pass-through cost from which the utility does not profit. If customers have NYSEG as their supplier, energy is sold at the price at which it is bought. For customers who have a third party as their supplier, customers will see their supply costs on a different page of their NYSEG bill or on a separate bill from the chosen supplier.

The State also requires a zero emissions charge and renewable emissions charge to be included in this line item. **These are government required charges.**

\$56.21 is a pass-through cost from supply.

\$57.37 goes to operations, maintenance, customer service, administrative costs, and continued investments into research & development.

## Weather Adjustment

\$2.54

A mechanism that moderates natural gas bills during any extreme weather between October 1 and May 31. Customers may receive a credit if temperatures are colder than normal and a charge if they are warmer than normal.

# Basic Service Charge/Delivery Charge

\$53.48

The rest of these two charges goes towards delivery, customer service, and investments into the infrastructure. The first 3 therms are included in this charge.

# **Transition Charge**

\$1.36

The remaining part of this charge reflects the recovery of lost and unaccounted for gas during delivery and the cost associated with reliability with the gas supply.

#### Research and Development Charge

\$0.15

This is an approved charge that is designed to support innovation that can improve energy efficiency, develop new technologies, and enhance the overall energy infrastructure.

## Revenue Decoupling Charge

-\$0.39

A credit or charge on the bill that reflects the difference between forecasted and actual delivery service revenues.


