Resolve to save money with these low-cost, no-cost tips:

1. **Get rid of window drafts:** Latch all of your sashes, and close your curtains and lower blinds at night.
2. **Use less energy for lighting:** Turn off lights whenever you leave a room. When replacing burned-out light bulbs, do so with LED bulbs that are energy misers.
3. **Use less hot water to save on your energy and water usage:**
 - Wash your clothes in cold water instead of warm or hot water.
 - Take shorter showers. Project SHARE Heating Fund Opens for Grant Applications!

Starting January 5, 2015, the **Project SHARE Heating Fund** will be open and accepting applications for grants. It will remain open until funds are exhausted. The **Project SHARE Heating Fund** helps low-income customers, as well as active members of the military and veterans, who are facing energy emergencies.

To be eligible for a **Project SHARE Heating Fund** grant, the applicant must:

- Have an active NYSEG account in their name; and
- Have an active disconnect notice; and
- Meet the HEAP income guideline, except: Active duty military members and well-discharged veterans may qualify regardless of income.

Applications for a grant must be made by the customer of record.

The maximum grant amount is \$350 and customers may apply once every 12 months.

The **Project SHARE Heating Fund** is administered by HeartShare Human Services of New York. Applications for grants must be submitted by an authorized intake agency or by calling HeartShare directly at **1.800.599.4327**. Removing Snow and Ice Safely

Be safe as we head deeper into the winter season. Please keep the following tips in mind:

- When removing snow and ice from driveways and sidewalks, make sure you stay clear of electric and natural gas meters to avoid damaging them, inadvertently disrupting service or putting yourself in danger. Snow and ice can damage electric and natural gas meters, natural gas pipes and natural gas regulators, so never bury any of this equipment when shoveling, using a snowblower or plowing.
- When removing snow or ice from a roof, never let it fall on electric or natural gas meters or related equipment.
- Natural gas appliance chimneys and vents should be kept free of snow and ice to prevent the build-up of potentially-deadly carbon monoxide.

Generator Safety

When properly sized, installed and operated, generators can safely power electrical equipment during power interruptions. However, you must follow proper procedures or you may place yourself and your family at serious risk. Also, improperly operated generators can feed electricity back into our lines, putting our people who are working to restore service in danger. **Please be sure to read, understand and follow all manufacturers' instructions for safe operation.**



Review these safety tips before using your generator.

- Operate your generator outdoors in a clean, dry, well-ventilated area and never indoors or in a garage.
- The generator must be properly grounded.
- After losing power, turn off the main circuit breaker or pull the main fuse block.
- All electrical connections must comply with the National Electric Code (NEC).
- Generators that are directly connected to existing wiring systems must use a double-pole, double-throw (DPDT) transfer switch.
- Do not overload a generator with too many appliances.
- Use properly-sized extension cords in good condition.
- You may be liable for damage or injury to people and property that may result from an improperly installed or operated emergency generator.
