If you're struggling with energy bills, we're making help easier to access. More households now qualify for monthly bill credits through our Enhanced Energy Affordability Program (EEAP).

If approved, we'll calculate your credit and apply it directly to your bill. EEAP is a two-year pilot program, so eligibility and enrollment periods may change. It's available to eligible customers who don't qualify for or aren't enrolled in EAP. Enrollment lasts 18 months.

Don't dig into trouble, know what's below

Whether you're a contractor or homeowner, safe digging starts with **UDig NY**. This free, statewide service identifies any underground utilities and protects you and others from injury.

It's easy. Call **811** or visit **UDigNY.org** between two and 10 working days before starting your project.

It's free. Utility representatives will visit the site to mark the location of underground electric, gas, water and any other utility-owned facilities.

It's the law. Accidentally digging into underground utilities can cause personal injury, environmental harm and costly damage.

Look up ... look out!

If you're headed outdoors with a list of home improvement projects, remember to watch overhead – it could save your life!

When working around the outside of your house, remember aluminum siding, gutters and ladders conduct electricity. Make sure none of these materials come into contact with an overhead wire. No line is safe to touch, ever!

If your project includes trimming trees, please don't trim near power lines; leave that trimming to us.

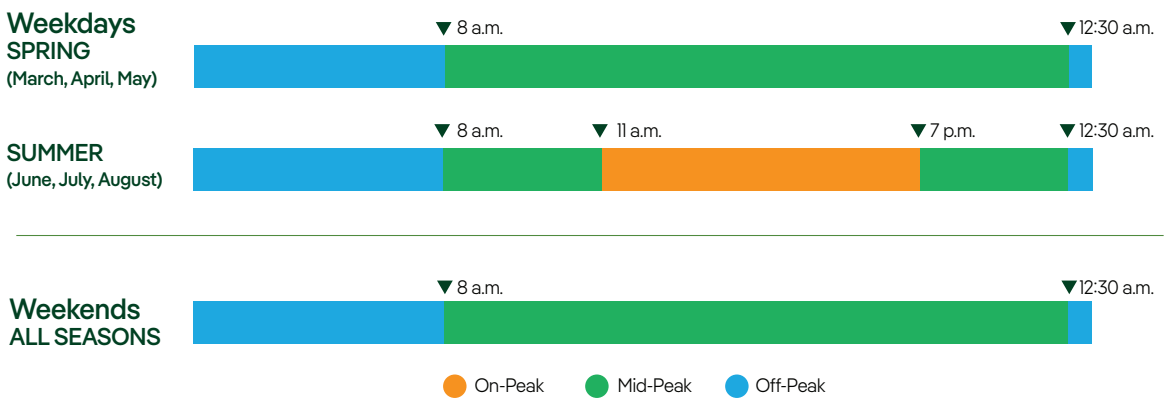
Are your timers set to save money?

Daylight Saving Time (DST) began Sunday, March 8. If you're a **NYSEG Time-of-Use (TOU) or Day-Night electricity service customer**, be sure any timers you use to control equipment or appliances during lower cost hours are always matched with the clock in your **NYSEG** electric meter.

To confirm if you're a TOU or Day-Night customer, please check your "Electricity Service" noted on your bill at the top of page 3.

The clocks in our Day-Night and TOU meters remain on Eastern Standard Time (EST) all year long. Please refer to the graph below for lower cost hours, or visit nyseg.com/TOU or nyseg.com/DayNight for more information.
